- In a very different landmark event,
 Olivia Colman made a film in Arundel.
 We are in touch with Blueprint Pictures.
 They can't tell us yet when Wicked Little
 Letters will be released, but we are trying to get a special red-carpet premiere here in Arundel, in aid of charity.
- We collected £10,000 from the film company and used part of it to support the Community Warm Hubs when energy

prices soared in the winter. The rest of that money we have put aside for future community projects.

Other events: during the year we saw
 Arundel recognised as England's first 'Bee
 Friendly' town.

 and we are now on the way to winning recognition as a **Dementia-Friendly** town too.

- Elevenses celebrated both the coronation and its own second birthday this week.
- Elevenses has become a major success, providing support for people living with dementia, their carers, and people who are socially isolated and just enjoy having coffee and a chat. For some people who attend, Elevenses is almost their only social interaction of the week.
- The meetings are enormous fun, and if you have never been to one I recommend it. Elevenses meets at the Lido every Monday, at 11.00am as the name suggests.

• The surgery, the Lido, Arundel Post Office, Lulamae's, Martin Steel, Monan Gozzett solicitors, have all received awards for being Dementia Friendly in the last year. If we can bring in some more organisations we can be recognised as a Dementia Friendly town-which would be something to be proud of.

- We ran our "reverse Father Christmas" programme, in which we collected food and donations rather than giving out presents

 Everything collected went to Home-Start and struggling local families in Arundel, and Home-Start told us in January that "the number and quality of donations from Arundel was simply staggering".

The Bell

• The Bell: we were very concerned when we learned that The Bell was faced with closure. Gill Farquharson was retiring from the editorship after 10 brilliant years and no one was willing to take over from her.

We couldn't let the Bell vanish.

- So we have stepped into the gap, providing a new editor, guaranteeing that the Bell will continue whilst giving it complete editorial independence. The next issue will be on your doormat in early June.
- The Bell has a vacancy for another volunteer advertising manager if you are interested, please speak to me.

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Brownies with Easter Egg

• Then there were the **Brownies**. We helped the Brownies carry out their Eggcellent idea-which saw them collect over 500 Easter eggs to give to people who might otherwise not receive one. These eggs went to Home-Start, My Sister's House (a charity for women and families who have suffered domestic abuse) and Elevenses, with some eggs going to struggling Arundel families identified by ACE and St. Philip's. A Truly Eggcellent effort

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Library

And in the last few weeks, we have finally

persuaded West Sussex County Council to re-open the top floor of the **library**, which has been mothballed for some years now, and Learning Tree Nursery will be back there in September, operating out of both the library and St. Philip's.

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FESTIVAL

- All of our regular events-Farmers Market,
 Mayor's Sunday, Remembrance Sunday
 and the Community Awards were well attended year.
- The Town Council is the largest sponsor of the Arundel Festival. Last year, research suggested that most people believe that the Festival plays an important part in increasing Arundel's sense of community and pride in our

town.

- It is the biggest event in the whole of Arun and after long discussion, we have secured an undertaking from Arun District Council to provide some short-term funding for the Festival whilst we build its sponsorship base and make it sustainable.
- So those are some of the events in the town in the last year.

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CAMPAIGNS

 We have also been fighting a number of campaigns for the town:

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BOUNDARY COMMISSION

 The Boundary Commission proposed to put us into a new 'Arundel and Littlehampton' parliamentary constituency, in which we would have been swamped by a much larger coastal town with very different issues to ours. Littlehampton Council didn't fancy being in bed with us either, together we campaigned against this, and the Boundary Commission has dropped the proposal and is now recommending to Parliament that we stay as we are as part of our Arundel and the South **Downs** constituency.

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Cast Iron Lamp columns

 Cast iron lamp columns are being replaced with stainless steel across West Sussex. We have campaigned to retain the appearance and character of our cast iron lamp columns in Arundel. We have now been told that no changes will be made in Arundel this year, and that our cast iron columns will be rubbed down and repainted.

 We are taking advantage of this period to try to get our cast iron lamps listed by Historic England, which will give them greater protection, whilst we explore other options.

Slide 27:

Safe Cycle Path to Ford

 We are tantalizing close to getting a safe cycle path to Ford Station. National Highways like our scheme and recognise the support it has from the Arundel community, but tell us they do not currently have the money to take it to the next stage (which will cost about £ half a million).

 However, National Highways have assigned it high-priority status in the next funding programme that begins in 2025. We need to keep the campaign front-of-mind with everyone and see whether Andrew can find a way to get National Highways to bring the timetable forward.

Slide 28:

'Bollardgate'

On King's Arms Hill, it's a case of **Spot the** difference.

West Sussex County Council tell us that the right bollard will be in place within the next 6 weeks.

It would be unfair to snails to say that it has proceeded at a snail's pace. But at least it is going to happen.

Slide 29:

ADC River Road Airbn

We strongly oppose Arun District Council's proposal to build an Airbnb in River Road. We believe the tide is turning against Airbnbs nationally, and that locally an increasing number of ADC Councillors are beginning to turn against the River Road scheme. But it has not been withdrawn and we need to fight on.

Slide 30:

Mill Road camper vans:

 Camper vans: We have not solved this. We still can't get a Traffic Regulation Order to stop camper van owners living on Mill Road. Even though we have even offered to pay for 100% of the costs

- Off the record West Sussex Highways officers have told us that the only way forward would be for us to make Mill Road - or a sizable part of Mill Road, time-limited parking, which means you would only be able to park there for, say, 1-2 hours. And even if we did accept time-limited parking, there would still be no guarantee that we would get the TRO.
- We have been reluctant to accept timelimited parking because it would apply to all of us. 1-2 hours would be no good for residents or for people who work in the businesses in the town and it could result in

some visitors in cars driving round the town looking for on-street parking.

• We are going to continue the debate with WSCC - and we may then do a referendum in the town to find out whether residents would accept time-limited parking as the price of dealing with campervan issues. If the answer is no, we will take that answer back to West Sussex County Council and tell them "Residents do not want this, so what alternatives can you offer to us?"

Keep Me Breathing Visual

Each year traditionally the Mayor adopts one or more charities for which

to raise money. This year I am adopting two charities: Home-Start with whom we worked last year and Keep Me Breathing. You have seen the leaflet on your seats. Only 2,500 children have this conditionn

in the world-and one Beau, live with his parents Ash and Eloise Kent, whom many of you know, here in Arundel.

The charity need to raise another £150,000 to enable the Cambridge University team to finish making a prototype of a breathing pacemaker that will mean that these children do not stop breathing when they fall asleep.
